Child Abuse Prevention Signs and Symptoms in a Classroom

The Florida Abuse Hotline accepts reports 24 hours a day and 7 days a week of known or suspected child abuse, neglect, or abandonment.

Sexual Abuse

Any sexual behavior (looking, showing, or touching) with a child to meet the adult's interest or sexual needs.

Physical Abuse

Any behavior that hurts the child's body (kicking, punching, stabbing, beating, burning, or choking) or otherwise harming a child to cause physical injury.

Psychological/Emotional Abuse

Any behavior pattern that impairs a child's sense of self-worth, emotional development, or mental well-being.

In 2018, the Children's Advocacy Centers in Florida served over 34,000 children who were victims of child abuse or neglect;

20,400 were females and 13,600 were males.



Possible Signs and Symptoms of Abuse

- Have frequent bruises, especially in places students do not normally get bruises from play
- Have stories to explain injuries that do not make sense or keep changing
- Not wanting to go home
- Avoid being with the abuser
- Avoid being with others
- Show signs of emotional trauma, like fear, anger, or trouble relating to or trusting others
- Being sad or depressed
- Bullying others
- Self-harm such as cutting, hitting their head against a hard-object, or punching objects
- Having nightmares or trouble sleeping
- Acting out in class, difficulty paying attention or being hyperactive
- Using drugs

Five Protective Factors

<u>Be Resilient</u> - the ability of parents to deal effectively with stress, adversity, or trauma.

<u>Have Friends</u> - relationships with family, friends, neighbors, or other community members.

<u>Know How to Find Help</u> - support and resources for the family during times of struggle and stress such as calling the school counselor or social worker.

<u>Know How Children Grow</u> - talk to medical and mental health professionals for assistance.



<u>Help Kids Handle Their Feelings</u> - social and emotional learning, which helps children properly label and understand different emotions in themselves and others.
